YES, PM, THERE IS A CASE FOR LNG

Last August, Prime Minister Trudeau remarkably stated "there has never been a strong business case" for Liquefied Natural Gas (LNG) exports from Canada to Europe. He was responding to requests from German Chancellor Olaf Scholz for help with Europe's energy crisis.

Bernard Shaw famously said, "People who say it cannot be done should not interrupt those who are doing it." Tourmaline Oil is doing it. Proving the Prime Minister wrong, Tourmaline began exporting Canadian natural

gas to the U.S. Gulf Coast in January, for onward export to Europe and Asia. Tourmaline will double gas exports in the next three years.

This is the first significant volume of Canadian gas to be exported beyond North America and overcomes the price discount the Canadian product has struggled with. Step aside, Mr. Trudeau. Canadian entrepreneurs are getting it done.



FIGHTING RISING FOOD COSTS

My Bow River riding is home to many irrigation districts that are primarily responsible for delivering water to agricultural land. Over 60 crop varieties are grown in the Bow River riding, and that is only possible because of irrigation.

In Alberta, 4% of the arable irrigated land equates to nearly 30% of agri-food GDP for a total of \$5.4 billion to provincial GDP. Water conveyance infrastructure supports hydropower generation, municipalities, industry, businesses, drought and flood mitiga-

tion, and recreation opportunities. I will continue to advocate for the expansion of irrigation and the exemption of carbon tax on power to run irrigation, as that cost has run into the millions.

When food inflation has averaged 10%, the last thing Canadians need is higher food costs because the government is punishing producers with a tax on growing food.

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ALBERTA MPS COVERING THE ISSUES

Many Albertans see Parliament at work in the daily question period, or in media scrums on the hot button issues of the day.

Those issues are important. But the Alberta Conservative Caucus is also engaged daily on a multitude of issues important to people in their communities, people in Alberta, and people across Canada.

This issue highlights just some of the work done behind the scenes by my colleagues. They are engaged in a very wide range of important issues.

Most Caucus members are also members of Standing Committees which keep a watchful eye on government policy, spending, and - yes - mistakes and missteps. Sometimes we can influence course corrections. At least we can shine a spotlight on issues so that media and Canadians know what is happening in government.

I am a member of the *Standing Committee on National Defence* and was previously chair of the *Standing Committee on Information, Privacy and Ethics*.

The Ethics Committee produced reports, amongst others, on facial recognition technology, surveillance devices used by the RCMP, collection of mobility data by the government, and the state of access to information in Canada.

The National Defence committee recently produced reports on Arctic Security, the Cyber Defence of Canada; and is also looking at the troubled procurement process in the Armed Forces.



I am also the Shadow Cabinet Minister for Prairie Economic Development and advisor to Opposition Leader Pierre Poilievre on Economy. My colleagues and I are kept busy working hard on a range of issues. Please take a look inside. 🍁

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ETHICS & OPEN GOVERNMENT

Conservatives on the Ethics Committee have been holding the Liberal Government to account on many scandals over the past eight years. In addition to addressing issues like foreign interference and contracts to close friends of Liberals in Cabinet, this committee plays a key role in promoting openness in Government.

An open and transparent Government is key for our democracy. Under the *Access to Information Act*, Canadians can file information requests. This is an important accountability tool for

Canadians, reporters, and Parliamentarians. Unfortunately, this system is broken.

Under the Liberals, the ATIP system has become slower and less transparent. The Ethics Committee has been working on this issue since October 2022, and I will continue fighting for the necessary changes to ensure the Government acts with transparency.

REPEALING THE ESCALATOR

Under this government, basic pleasures like sharing a bottle wine with a loved one or enjoying a beer with friends have become increasingly unaffordable.

Last year I tabled Bill C-266 to repeal the automatic annual tax increase on beer wine and spirits. While my bill has not yet passed, and the automatic escalator remains in place, sustained pressure on the Liberals forced them to reduce what would have been an automatic 6.3% tax increase, to only 2%.

The automatic tax escalator still needs to be repealed so that future governments have to ask Parliament before increasing the tax on beer wine and spirits, and Conservatives will continue to stand up for producers, consumers, and Parliamentary accountability, until Bill C-266 is fully implemented.

SUPPORTING JUROR MENTAL HEALTH

I'm very pleased that Bill S-206, the Juror Mental Health Bill, of which I was the House of Commons sponsor, has now become law.

Jury duty can come at significant personal sacrifice. Jurors are often exposed to horrific evidence that can cause long-lasting mental health issues, including PTSD.

Since 2018, I worked across party lines to amend the Criminal Code so that former jurors experiencing mental health issues can disclose all as-

pects of their jury service with a mental health professional bound by confidentiality.

Prior to S-206, it was a Criminal Code offence for a former juror to disclose any aspect of the deliberation process, even to a mental health professional.

This small but important legislative change will go a long way to support the mental health of former jurors.



SUPPORTING ADDICTIONS RECOVERY

I have once again tabled my Private Member's Bill to amend the *Health of Animals Act*. This Bill is an important step in protecting biosecurity on farms, and fight for the mental health of our hardworking farm families.

I have also Seconded MP Ben Lobb's Bill C-234 which has just passed through the House. This will exempt farm fuel from the carbon tax. For too

long, farmers have paid tens of thousands of dollars in carbon tax to produce food for Canadian families — we need to right that wrong.

In addition, I have Seconded MP Scot Davidson's Bill C-280, an Act to amend the *Bankruptcy and Insolvency Act*, providing financial protection for fruit and vegetable growers.



STANDING UP FOR SENIORS

Through a petition to Parliament, I raised national awareness about a serious threat facing many Seniors.

Canadians are concerned that people with a history of sexually inappropriate behaviours are permitted to live in close quarters with vulnerable Seniors in care homes.

The petition cited the tragic case of a Calgary Alzheimer's patient, Ruth, whose sex assault could've been prevented if care homes took these threats more seriously.

The inability to separate known sexual abusers from very vulnerable populations is allowing them to commit their crimes with little recourse. This violates the vulnerable and causes untold stress and anxiety for their families.

It's time the Liberal government table legislation to prevent known sex offenders from cohabitating in facilities with known vulnerable Seniors.



SUPPORTING UKRAINE

Ukrainians first immigrated to Alberta in the early 1890s. Today, more than 345,000 people of Ukrainian heritage call Alberta home, and Lakeland is home to the highest percentage of Ukrainian Canadians.

This year, our community welcomed the Ukrainian National hockey team at the Pysanka, the second largest Ukrainian easter egg in the world, in Vegreville. I also spoke with displaced Ukrainian families who made their home in Vegreville, the local community organizers who support the fami-

lies, and wished luck to the local Vegreville Vipers hockey team, whose entire staff is from Ukraine.

Our community also held a candlelight Vigil under the Pysanka this year to recognize 354 days since the war began in Ukraine. We will always support Ukrainians in Lakeland and across Canada, and for the territorial sovereignty of Ukraine and their right to live peacefully and securely.
