REPEALING THE ESCALATOR Pat Kelly, MP Calgary Rocky Ridge

Under this government, basic pleasures like sharing a bottle wine with a loved one or enjoying a beer with friends have become increasingly unaffordable.

Last year I tabled Bill C-266 to repeal the automatic annual tax increase on beer wine and spirits. While my bill has not yet passed, and the automatic escalator remains in place, sustained pressure on the Liberals forced them to reduce what would have been an automatic 6.3% tax increase. to only 2%.
